### **PREFACE**

The book titled as the *Voices Across the Pir Panjal* explores the Pahari Ethnic Tribe of Jammu and Kashmir, a diverse community with linguistic, cultural and socio-political complexities. It provides a comprehensive anthropological and sociological account of their lives in the mountainous pirpanjal region, highlighting their resilience and cultural richness.

This book explores the history, culture and contemporary struggles of the Pahari people, providing a comprehensive anthropological and sociological account of their unique blend of resilience and cultural richness in pir panjal region of Jammu and Kashmir. The Paharis, a diverse community characterized by resilience, cultural richness and socio-economic challenges, are a subject of scholarly attention due to their shared heritage and language.

Voices Across the Pir Panjal was inspired by the realisation that the Pahari community was underrepresented in the larger story of ethnic diversity in Jammu and Kashmir. The Paharis, despite their substantial presence in districts like Poonch, Rajouri, Baramulla and Kupwara, have frequently remained on the fringes of scholarly discourse, while groups like the kashmiri, Gujjars, Bakarwals and Dogras have received a great deal of attention from academics and policymakers. By focussing on the Pahari experience, examining their secular identity, linguistic heritage and the socio-political factors that have influenced their pursuit of recognition most notably, their recent inclusion in the Scheduled Tribe list in 2024 this book aims to close this gap.

In order to shed light on the cultural practices, social practices and historical experiences of the Pahari community, this study draws on a extensive research, including archival sources, ethnographic insights and current socio-political analyses. The Paharis are positioned within the larger anthropological and sociological frameworks of ethnicity, identity and social equity in this work, which helps to clarify the intricacies of tribal and linguistic identities in a diverse and conflict-ridden region.

Scholars, students, policymakers and readers with an interest in South Asian anthropology and sociology especially those who are interested in indigenous studies, ethnic minorities and cultural preservation are the target audience for this book. In addition to giving the Pahari people a voice, I hope this work encourages a wider discussion about the opportunities and difficulties of acknowledging diverse identities in a socio-political environment that is changing quickly. This book serves as a tribute to their resilient nature and an appeal to acknowledge their legitimate position within Jammu and Kashmir's cultural and political fabric.
